

Abundant Life gets to the heart of what it means to follow Jesus, not mastering information, but living for God in real-life. Following the example of Jesus and Paul, you have a tool for helping someone who needs a spiritual parent.

There are many things I like about the course: its willingness to talk freely about taboo subjects; the way it promotes, even provokes dialogue between new and older Christians; and the practical way it touches the big issues a new Christian will face. This sometimes causes a reaction as people find themselves face to face with their need to come under God's authority. Working through Abundant Life shows the need to change: something people don't always find easy or agreeable. I took the course with a friend after doing a Bachelors then two-thirds of a Masters degree in Theology. I was surprisingly humbled at the way Abundant Life showed many areas God still needed to work in my life.

I especially like how Abundant Life addresses the need to overthrow strongholds in our life – an image used by many Christian counsellors to relate the way our past shapes our perceptions, struggles, and hang-ups. Abundant Life is simple enough to engage people young and old; but it also leads them to a rich understanding of how God wants to bring lasting change in the way they live real-life.
